## 1. Intertwined swans

This sculpture is made of four limestone blocks and represents interlaced swans. The sculpture weighs four tons. It is a sculpture in yellow limestone extracted from a quarry near Laufen (Basel-Landschaft). The type of stone used is Laufener Unicato.

Artist: Ewald Brigger, sculptor and creator of the International Symposium of Sculpture.

Origin: The town of Morges puchased this sculpture in 2012. It was an order to decorate the roundabout of Petit-Bois.

**Location**: Roundabout of Petit-Bois, Avenue Ignace Paderewski.

## 2. Forel Monument

This erratic rock was erected in 1915 in memory of the scholar François-Alphonse Forel. In order to honour his memory, a bronze medallion made by sculptor Raphaël the Lugeon is integrated inside the rock.

**Artist** : Raphaël Lugeon, Sculptor.

**Origin**: This stone comes from the area of Mollens in the Canton de Vaud.

**Location** : Parc de l'Indépendance

## 3. The Fountain of Hercules

This fountain is ornated by a bronze sculpture. On the base stands, we can see the 12 labors of Hercules. This is a copy of the bronze found in Pompéi.

Artist: Unknown

Origin: Aloys Hugonnet donated this scupture in memory of his father Jules Hugonnet. Origin: Jules Hugonnet is at the origin of the layout of the Park of independance in 1884. This foutain in the Park of independance dates from 1913.

**Location** : Parc de l' Indépendance

### 4. The monument to the French internees

During the 1870 war between France and Prussia, a part of the French soldiers took refuge in Morges. On 2 March 1871, an explosion of the arsenal killed 22 French soldiers and 2 citizens of Morges, while they were manipulating rifle cartdridges in the courtyard of the castle. In 1915, this monument was erected in their memory.

This Obelisk is made of limestone from Saint-Triphon and is named after the victims.

Artist: Unknown

**Origin**: Originally, this obelisk was located in the cemetery of Saint-Roch (Morges).

**Location** : Parc de l' Indépendance

# 5. Vaud patriots monument

This obelisk is made of stone from Echaillon (in Isère) a rare oolitic limestone from France.

This monument was intended for the centenary of the Vaud revolution in 1898 but was achieved in 1900. The obelisk celebrates the memory of Jean-Jacques Cart (1747-1813), Jules Muret (1759-1847) and Henri Monod (1753-1833), who all had a proeminent role during the revolution.

Artist: Théophile van Muyden, architect from Lausanne; David Doret, marble mason and Raphaël Lugeon, engraver, sculptor and medal maker from the Canton de Vaud.

Origin: This sculpture was designed by Théophile Muyden, the obelisk was made by David Doret and the bronze plates crafted by Raphaël Lugeon.

**Location** : Parc de l'Indépendance.

## 6. Van Oyen Monument

This obelisk made of clear limestone was desgined in 1828. It celebrates the memory of the dutch count Heindrick Jan van Oyen. He obtained the rank of General, serving Napoleon I. He was naturalized as a Swiss citizen and bourgeois of Morges in 1825.

Nowadays, the locket that was initially embedded in one of the sides of the obelisk is missing.

Artist: Louis Bagotti, architect.

Origin: This obelisk initially stood in the cemetery of Saint-Roch and was brought in the Parc de l'Indépendance in 1961.

**Location** : Parc de l'Indépendance.



### 7. The bandstand

This structure was demolished in 1961 and rebuilt in a simplified version in 1987.

This bandstand (surrounded by 100'000 tulips during the annual Tulip Festival in the spring), is dated from 1897 and has undergone many changes during the 20th and 21th centuries.

Artist: the design was made by Auguste Badan, a locksmith from Morges.

Origin: Between 1895 and 1896, the architects Gabriel Trivelli and Henri André submitted to the town various bandstand projetcs. This one was made out of wood. It was first built in 1897.

**Location** : Parc de l'Indépendance.

## 8. The fountain and its swan

This sculpture made of stone represents a swan standing on the foutain.

It is possible to see the name of "Jean Vuilleumier" on it.

**Artist**: Jean-Lucien Vuilleumier

Origin: The foutain was requested by the town of Morges in 1965.

**Location**: The fountain is located behind the house of tourism, on the quay Mont-Blanc.



## 9. The white stone swan

This scupture made out of white stone represents a swan. The name of Ewald Brigger can be read on it.

Ewald Brigger was the creator and a well-known sculptor of Morges' International Symposium of scupture.

**Artist**: Brigitte Landwehr, sculptor.

Origin: This scupture was offered by Bildhauerschule of Mulheimen during the International Symposium "Taille direct" in Morges in june 1992.

**Emplacement**: Along the quay Lochmann in front of the Romantik Mont-Blanc hotel.

Artist: Martin Milo (1893-1970), sculptor and medal maker from the Canton de Vaud.

Origin: This satue was a request by the town of Morges in 1962.

**Location**: Along the quay Lochmann, near the Casino.

## 11. Switzerland

This sculpture is made of stone of Comblanchien that shares the same charactericts as marble.

Artist: Ewald Brigger, sculptor et creator of Morges' International Symposium of sculpture. Origin: This is a donation of the artist to the town of Morges for its 700 years of the Confederation.

**Location**: Along the quay Lochmann, in front of the Casino.

## 12. Set of four ornamental swans

This sculpture built with bronze reprents four swans.

Artist: Edouard-Marcel Sandoz, sculptor, figurist, specialist of animals and painter with Jean Gagnebin, painter and designer of theaters. Origin: Edouard-Marcel Sandoz created this group of four swans for the town of Morges. Following the donation in 1966, the municipality commissioned Jean Gagnebin to realise the basin in 1968.

**Location**: Along the quay Lochmann, near the Casino.

# 13. The head of René Morax

This sculpture is made of bronze and represents the playwright and director from Morges, René Morax.

**Artist**: Ernst Willi, sculptor from Zurich.

Origin: In 1962, the statue was donated to the town of Morges by Samuel Campiche, a patron.

**Location**: Place de l'Église 2, in the garden behind the church.

Artist: André Pirlot, sculptor from Morgien; Roger Jan, blacksmith, helped by André Vauthy and Roland Ruffieux. Origin: The statue was ordered by the town of Morges in 1973. It was forged by Roger Jan, who was in charge of the town's forge workshop with employees of the road department.

Location: Parc de Vertou.

# 15. Ignace Paderewski

This statue is made of bronze. It represents the pianist, composer and Polish statesman, Ignace Paderewski, standing and pronouncing his great speech in Washington. This speech was made while Paderewksi was defending Poland in America.

Artist: Martin Milo, sculptor and medal maker from the Canton de Vaud

Origin: Donated from the comittee of the Paderewski society to the town of Morges on 3rd July 1948.


Location: between the Place St-Louis and Rue du Docteur-Yersin.

## 19. Travertine fountain

Artist: Jean-Denis Cruchet, sculptor from the Canton de Vaud

#### Origin:

This fountain was requested in 1986 by the architect Jean Serexand handed over to the town in 1987.

**Location**: Rue de la Gare 11 (near the post office).

# 21. Lydia Opienska-Barblan


In the form of a large "donut" made out of white Carrara marble, this elegant sculpture sits in a stone niche.

Every two years since 1992, the Symposium in Morges has brought together professional and amateur artists in a large open-air studio.

For 12 days, some twenty sculptors from the four corners of the globe give shape to their creations. The Symposium stands out for its work-in-progress character and in situ activity.
