TAKE YOUR TIME!



The 404 km² of the Gantrisch Nature Park are home to numerous attractions. The Sense Gorges are particularly fascinating, as the river winds freely through lush alluvial plains and offers an unspoilt natural setting. Take a walk along its footpaths and be rewarded with some delightful and unforgettable experiences.

One hour, is how long it takes to walk along the Sense from the Guggerbach bridge in Zumholz, to Planfayon. The river, with its habitat still intact, attracts walkers away from the beaten track. Who would not be tempted to dip their toes into the cool, refreshing mountain water on a hot day? Resistance is futile! Barefoot on the gravel or sand banks, looking for the roundest pebble, wild flowers or colourful insects, the glories of nature will sweep away all your day-to-day worries. The undulating river bed stretches to the summits of the Fribourg and Bernese Alps, including the famous Gantrisch (2.175 m). This is the source of the river that has been declared the most natural in the Northern Alps by the WWF. Its long and timeless course transforms the rocks into pretty pebbles and deposits them at the feet of walkers, like Alpine pearls.

As a biologist and head of the nature and landscapes division of the Gantrisch Nature Park, Fabian Reichenbach has special responsibility for monitoring biodiversity on the alluvial plains of the Sense. He organises special clearance days to preserve the landscape and protect the indigenous flora and fauna from invasive plants. Time is up for unwanted species such as Japanese knotweed and goldenrod. These have no natural enemies and are spreading at an explosive rate, pushing out rare indigenous plants, which are an essential food source for insects and birds.

Fabian ruthlessly pulls out an Impatiens glandulifera: "You have to get the roots out too. Throw it in the bin or leave it on a stone so that it dries out or dies before it can spread even more!" Measures to eradicate the invasive newcomers may seem like a Sisyphean task, but they are successful: the little river is now free of the weed. This voluntary commitment to maintaining the landscape is also an opportunity to grasp the importance of biodiversity and take advantage of the extensive knowledge of the park's experts. The days welcome groups on company outings as well as any interested individuals. Apart from the invasive plants, everyone is welcome in the Gantrisch Nature Park.

COME... TO RELAX

Over 20 years ago, hurricane Lothar swept through Switzerland, leaving a trail of destruction in its wake. Les Paccots region was not spared. In some spots, the managed forest was transformed into unstructured woodland, with a completely different look where the conifers fell and the light streamed in. José Genoud, who was in charge of the area, observed the changes in the clearings, which became an ecological paradise for a number of species. The walking trails in Les Paccots bring hikers close to this biodiversity. The abandoned tree trunks provide abundant food and shelter for a large number of birds, helping to sustain life. The nature warden recommends that walkers discover the region's treasures while respecting the environment. It is essential not to leave the waymarked paths, to avoid disturbing the wildlife. "It's important to leave the animals their comfort zone, like mud baths for stags. If you find fresh prints, you can learn a lot without having to follow them, particularly in winter." A pair of binoculars allows you to observe without disturbing.

In the bushes, the Eurasian wren hops from branch to branch, too busy with its own activities to be afraid of walkers. "Just stand still for 10 minutes and you're sure to see something", explains the warden. The common chiffchaff can be identified by its song, like a metronome perched in the trees. A trumpet sounding in the forest is a black woodpecker warning of our presence. It can reach a wingspan of 51 cm, with the male easily identified by his red crest.





LE NIREMONT

Beautiful in any season

Easily accessible from the Alpine restaurant La Goille au Cerf, a walk in the Niremont is a special experience. In spring, walkers marvel at the bright green of the meadows; later in the year, the atmosphere of long summer evenings is far removed from day-today life on the plain, while autumn colours create a final warm flourish before the winter. www.fribourgregion.ch/mag7

COME... AND GLIDE ON THE WATER A WOMAN CAPTAIN AT THE HELM

Corinne Stauffer is the first woman captain operating on the Three-Lakes region with a BII/2 certificate, but she takes it in her stride. With two fingers on the joystick, she's perfectly at home in charge of the 560-seat tourist boat called the "Ville d'Yverdon".



At 9.50 am, the captain leaves Murten on the dot, at the helm of the "Ville d'Yverdon". A member of the crew brings her coffee up to the bridge in a sign of teamwork. It's an important gesture for Corinne Stauffer: "On the water, we all look out for each other." Supporting and helping other people are some of the fundamental qualities of a good captain. "My father was a captain on Lake Biel. One day, I helped out in the restaurant on board. By that evening, I knew I wanted a career on the water." After she had finished her apprenticeship as a junior sailor and inspector, she had to complete 75 days on the water to qualify as a full sailor. This training allowed her to become an on-board cashier, but also to be

able to take the helm if required. After 125 days on the water, plus a series of courses and examinations under the supervision of the Federal Office of Transport, she qualified as a captain BII/2, the highest level of licence for motor boats in Swiss waters, in autumn 2018.

Murten has disappeared from the horizon, as a 20km/h breeze blows across the lake. Corinne Stauffer is sailing towards the vineyards of Mont Vully. Just before Môtier, she gently turns the 49.6 metre-long boat to avoid the waves it has created. To dock, she goes up on deck, which offers a better view of the jetty. As soon as all the passengers are on board, she sounds the siren to signal her departure. Warm days unquestionably demand more attention, as bathers can appear in the waves at any time. After stopping in Praz and Sugiez, the boat sails on to the idyllic La Broye canal, where it has to deal with lots more inflatables. Downstream from the BirdLife nature centre in La Sauge, it turns once more before Lake Neuchâtel comes into view, astonishingly calm and very welcome too! It continues at 19.7 km/h, to the port of Neuchâtel. Captain Stauffer takes a moment during the cruise to chat to a colleague who is working to become captain of a steam boat.

COME... FOR THE ADVENTURE

Florence Nikles and Sébastien Monney never tire of the Gastlosen massif, known to some climbers as the Swiss Dolomites. The vertiginous limestone walls are perfect for anyone who loves to climb, from beginners to experienced mountaineers.





Fribourg residents Florence Nikles and Sébastien Monney have both been part of the Swiss Alpine Club's Expedition Team. The three-year course run by the SAC trains the next generation of mountaineers. The seasoned climbers who take part find it a formative and unforgettable experience. A dream that is only available to a handful of young men and women. Florence, who tried her luck in 2016, embarked on three days of selective training, including a day's indoor climbing, a test of physical

condition (cross-country skiing) and a bivouac in the snow. It was both a physical and psychological challenge, ending with climbing on an ice fall. For three years, she went on more and more field trips, ultimately finishing the course with an expedition in the Pamir mountains, in Kyrgyzstan, where she put all the skills she had learned into practice. Florence spent part of her childhood in the village of Jaun, at the foot of the Gastlosen. The landscape of the Pre-Alps gave her a taste for adventure and sporting challenges. At the age of 16, she learned to climb the limestone walls there. Since then, her passion for climbing and mountaineering in general has grown steadily. She takes her friends on various climbs there, or just out for a walk, all year round. The region is less busy in winter and much appreciated for its peace and quiet.

For Sébastien, who is now a mountain guide, the reputation he earned with the SAC Expedition Team gave his career an early boost. "And I also learned Swiss German!", an undeniable professional advantage. With contagious enthusiasm, he accompanies amateur climbers who are keen to know the northern walls of the spot better. There are routes that are accessible for novices with some basic knowledge but also more challenging ones to satisfy seasoned climbers. International champions regularly run into each other and attempt new exploits. Its climbing areas, charm, panoramic views and ease of access are all factors in making this place a hive of activity for mountain enthusiasts. The Gastlosen massif has sparked many passions like Florence and Sébastien's, and consistently challenges rock-climbers from the local area and elsewhere.

MOLÉSON-SUR-GRUYÈRES Gaining height

Brave climbers can tackle the Moléson from mid-June to the end of October, weather permitting. The via ferrata covers 1,310 m of cables and a change in altitude of 370 m, as your feet dangle over the void, or almost! There are two routes to the summit, "Le Pilier" or "La Face", both of which take 3 hours 30. www.fribourgregion.ch/mag11

THE FAMOUS CUCHAULE AOP....

It's not bread but it's not brioche either. Cuchaule AOP owes its inimitable flavour to the traditional recipe using saffron, which also gives it its wonderful yellow colour.





There are as many recipes for this delicious tart as there are villages... and perhaps even more. Here's one of them – so get cooking!

Recipe for 4 tarts

Pastry: 1 kg flour, 1 large pinch of salt, 25 g yeast, mixed with a little warm water, 70 g melted butter, 800 ml milk, 15 g butter, 1 egg, beaten. Filling: 400 g caster sugar, 150 ml double cream, 1 egg yolk, 150 g butter.

Mix the flour, salt, yeast mixture and melted butter into 1/3 of the milk, gradually add the rest of the milk (warmed) and knead until you have a light, puffy, airy dough (around 20 min.). Add the butter and egg as you knead. Grease four tart tins; divide the pastry between the tins and leave to rise (around 1 hour) in a warm room. Create a decorative finish on the edges by making holes with your fingers (or use a pastry wheel to create a lozenge pattern); brush with the cream and egg mixture; place small dots of butter in the holes (where the lozenges meet) and sprinkle the crushed sugar over the whole surface. Bake in a very hot oven (300°) for 8 to 10 minutes according to taste.

Enjoy a generous portion with a glass of Traminer from the Vully.



A CLICK AWAY, FROM THE MIDDLE AGES

The engraving by Martin Martini (1606) depicting Fribourg in detail is a marvellous piece of heritage. Cédric Clément, director of Fribourg Tourism, used it as his inspiration for a fabulous, threedimensional, digital experience, immersing visitors in the medieval life of the Old Town of Fribourg. Thanks to digital technologies, we have been able to geolocate the Martini Plan of 1606, i.e. we have used Martin Martini's engravings and superimposed them on modern, digital maps to create a new kind of audio guide. Anyone can download the app or borrow a tablet from the Tourist Office, wander through the streets in the Old Town and delve into the past. You'll meet the engraver and his contemporaries of the past in person, going about their daily lives. Thanks to virtual reality, we can take you on a journey through time, so you can be both here and now, but also there and then.

Is it a modern kind of history lesson?

No, more an invitation to step into another time, in other words, an adventure, in which we follow Marie as she looks for her husband, Hans. The characters take us to 20 important places in the town and look around them, giving us the sense of seeing through their eyes... But I won't say anymore!

Espace 1606 is an unmissable place - what's there?

Specialists have reconstructed our Old Town based on Martini's plan, on a scale of 1:250, in three dimensions, over 52 m². This new attraction in the old Werkhof in the Old Town is unbeatable, for both visitors and the local population.

For me, it's much more than a model: in a way, it's the DNA of our town and a gateway to another world. Six characters from the period appear on life-size screens in a short introductory video: Martin Martini himself, a Lansquenet, a patrician, a cloth merchant, a female healer and a street entertainer. Augmented reality connects their stories to the model. A visit to Espace 1606, combined with an individual audio guide, is really ideal, while the outdoor trail allows you to see the characters in their own neighbourhood.

Are there other ways of experiencing medieval Fribourg? Yes, of course! We've had a lot of success with our urban golf, which

is very popular with groups and families, for over ten years now. We've now developed the City Game, which echoes the spirit of 1606, but also includes a fun competition... In the end, it all comes down to the temperament of the people taking part. The whole town becomes a giant playground.

What are the highlights to visit?

Fribourg is a nice town for walkers. The ramparts, for example, are open during the day, from spring to autumn. 

COME... OUT OF CURIOSITY ARTICHOKE WAKES UP THE WALLS!

Héléna Galera, who works with the Tourist Office in Estavayer-le-Lac, has worked with passionate determination to create a street-art trail in the heart of the medieval city. A unique achievement that sheds new light on the main town in La Broye.



Where did the street-art idea come from?

Whenever I travel, I look carefully at what's on walls and the different styles used. Barcelona, New York, Valencia and Bali are all impressive and inspiring examples. I wanted to create something similarly offbeat in the town I love. An alternative project like this can really surprise visitors. The idea of street art is generally not well understood most people just think of tags or graffiti. We wanted to show that street art can respect walls and create real added-value for a town. Other municipalities are also interested in the idea.

What were the main difficulties?

To be honest, I didn't think it was feasible, but we have some very effective partners. We worked hand-in-hand with the municipal authorities to reach the necessary agreements with the Heritage Committee and the Department of Culture. We first suggested 90 locations where artists could express themselves. By the end of the discussions, there were eight

or ten. Then we had to find people who would agree to comply with the instructions for each space: no screw here, no colour there, a specific size over there, etc. We also had to persuade the owners, who had to agree without knowing exactly what the end result would be. I'm really pleased that people dared to play the game.

How have citizens and visitors reacted in general?

Now we have property owners contacting us to offer their wall, so people clearly like it. The townspeople have taken the works on board and most of them think they enhance the town. I think we've managed to achieve a respectful balance between contemporary art and medieval architecture.

How do you follow the trail?

It's been designed like an open-air gallery. The map can be downloaded from www.artichokefestival.ch or www.estavayer-payerne.ch. The town's Tourist Office has produced a paper version and you can purchase a booklet to find out more

about the artists, their inspirations and their biographies. You can also book a guided tour - allow 1 hour to 1 hour 15 minutes to get round all the works.

Could you describe the artists' works for us?

Each one is very different. Sometimes they produce their work in their own studio, while others work directly on the wall. The 788 steel origamis by Mademoiselle Maurice (France) took three long days to hang. Raguel Rodrigo's giant cross-stitches at Grand-Rue 40 were produced with four other people in her Spanish studio and took a day to install here. Visitors who follow the trail will discover there's more to street art than just painting.

Now you can paddle a canoe along the shores of Lake Neuchâtel and admire the nature reserve's wildlife with the help of a biologist! Might you spot a red-crested pochard or see a great cormorant take off? www.fribourgregion.ch/mag17

Demonstrations by the glassmaker Thomas Blank at the Swiss Museum of Stained Glass and Glass Art offer a glowing insight into glassmaking techniques. Participants have the chance to get close to the magical feeling of molten materials.

Thomas Blank is a craftsman and glassmaker with an educational bent. He was trained in Venetian techniques in the famous studios on the island of Murano and now shares some of his knowledge in demonstrations and workshops at the museum in Romont. His fascination for working with fire has not dimmed in over 20 years. The job demands endurance and perseverance but it is enormously satisfying to see his efforts rewarded when a piece is finished, after hours of hard work. The glassmaker's tools have remained almost unchanged for 500 years. The blowpipe, a long, metal rod, is plunged into the furnace to pick up the mass of molten glass. Tongs are used to stretch, twist, flatten and shape the glowing bulb. As for the block, a sort of large, wetted wooden ladle, Thomas uses it as the glassmakers of the past did, to shape the mass of crystal into a ball before blowing it. It starts with a pocket of air, blown dry, which he gradually expands to produce several sizes of glass. To remove the piece, he uses a drop of water - the difference in temperature cleanly slices off the foot that held it onto the blowpipe.

I'm going to have a try at mastering this traditional craft. The four ovens are producing lots of heat, the air is heavy and you have to move slowly and calmly. Thomas passes me the blowpipe, whose tip is covered with a ball of reddish molten glass. I sit down to roll the rod on the trestle, clumsily trying to stop the ball from falling to the ground. Using my right hand, I grab a long pair of tongs. For the first few seconds, the glass can be shaped easily but it quickly pales and hardens. I'm much too slow. While the original idea was to produce a figurative piece, I dial down my ambition in a second. The material can be reheated as often as necessary. I'm no more successful the second time and I won't be making a flower or even a recognisable shape, but the pleasure of trying out an ancient art is unforgettable!



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
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
